



he Buffalo-Niagara Region is the fortunate home of a wealth of Philanthropies of Color, all working through individual fundraising, advocacy, programs, and more to support youth of color. Although many may not self-identify as "philanthropies," these groups work to address challenges and connect communities of color to opportunities in the Buffalo-Niagara Region.


The City of **Buffalo** is the major urban center in the region and continues to grow in diversity. People of color now comprise more than 50% of the population.

In the 2014-2015 school year, 25,571 students of color were enrolled in Buffalo Public Schools and all are eligible for support services and scholarships through **Say Yes Buffalo.**

People of color are earning more college degrees from local institutions, allowing growth in the region's skilled workforce and increased job opportunities.

ore than 100 Philanthropies of Color have been identified in the Buffalo-Niagara Region. These philanthropies are defined by the CGLI as organizations that use their time, talent, treasure, and ties to improve the quality of life for communities of color in the region. In creating the landscape, the CGLI examined organizations that were founded, led, and/or governed primarily by people of color and were not affiliated with religious institutions. Each organization brings different assets that uniquely address challenges in the community as described below:



YOUTH SERVING

An organization that has programming targeted to youth.

- Has face-to-face contact with youth on a daily basis
- Able to voice youth-specific concerns
- Has expertise in program implementation for youth



TRADE

An organization whose members are comprised of a particular industry or profession.

- Membership has expertise in a wide range of skills and professions
- Access to a professional network with mentoring opportunities



IDENTITY

An organization whose members identify with one specific or set of racial or ethnic groups.

- Has a finger on the pulse of a specific community
- Able to voice concerns of constituent members with cultural sensitivity and acuity



FUNDRAISING

An organization with a primary purpose to raise funds for communities of color.

- Able to mobilize resources to support the needs of the community
- Builds strong relationships with people of influence



GREEK/FRATERNAL

Fraternities, sororities, and fraternal groups with historic ties to a specific race or ethnicity.

- Community service oriented
- Source of mentorship and networking
- Close knit membership with socially-minded ideals



NEIGHBORHOOD

An organization whose mission is to support a specific, geographically defined community.

- Offers a welcoming, familiar environment for youth
- Aware of the most pressing issues facing a specific community

THE NETWORK

GENERATING AWARENESS

A voice at the table for communities and youth of color requires being a part of the decision-making process and improving local understanding of the challenges facing communities of color. Creating awareness around these causes will guarantee that the voices of youth of color are amplified today and for future generations to come.



STRENGTHENING COLLABORATION

Philanthropies of Color in the Buffalo-Niagara Region share fundamental common values that naturally lead to a common community purpose. Although most of these organizations are unfamiliar with one another's work, their missions align and lead to a desire for natural collaboration, thus leveraging collective power.
